

Deicing Salts & Your Landscape



Using deicing salts is a great way to keep your driveway, walkways, and stairs safe and ice-free in the winter. It's important to use salts carefully because they can damage plants and hardscape materials.

Plant Damage: Salts can easily enter the soil in planting beds and lawns that are next to driveways, walkways, and roads. Salts in the soil make water less available to the plants, causing chemical drought in the growing season. Salts that land on plants can damage those parts of the plant or sometime kill the entire plant.

Solutions: Keep salts away from the edges of driveways and walkways. Sweep up the salt once it is no longer needed. Be careful not to shovel salts into the

of salts: [Salt-tolerant Plants](#).

Hardscape Damage: Once the salt mixes with water, it can enter into pores in concrete, bricks, and stone. Pressure caused by the freezing and expanding of the solution causes fractures and flaking of the material.

Solutions: Lightly distribute the salt; do not over-apply. Sweep up the salt once it is no longer needed. Avoid salting brick or stone paths. Use a concrete sealant to minimize salt infiltration.

Makes a great water-efficient substitute for the Japanese Maple.


